

Summer Safety Tips


With summer right around the corner, here are some tips to help make your summer a safer and more enjoyable time.

- Stay hydrated- if you feel thirsty, you are already a bit dehydrated. Take plenty of water breaks and avoid alcohol and sugary drinks.
- Limit your outdoor activity between 10am and 4pm when the sun is at its highest intensity. If you do have to work outside, apply sunscreen 30 minutes prior to going out and re-apply every few hours.
- If you start to feel tired/weak/faint seek either shade or air conditioning and drink cool (not cold) fluids, preferably water or a sports drink.
- Never leave a child or animal unattended in a vehicle, they can become dangerously hot in a matter of minutes. (<http://www.miemss.org/home/emsc/cps>)
- Always stay with children in any type of pool or other body of water.
- Make sure your outdoor pets have access to shade and water.
- Lastly, check on any elderly friends or family you have, especially on hot days, to make sure they are staying cool and hydrated.

Dear Chief Hoppes:

I am writing this letter to thank your department for the recent donation of 172 smoke alarms to our department. A change in Maryland law made the alarms obsolete and so Fire Marshal Eric Cramer and Lieutenant Bryan Lewis approached Tyler Watkinson about giving them to us. Tyler arranged for the transport of the alarms to our office.

We have already found a home for 20 of the alarms. A local summer camp had alarms in their cabins that were well over 10 years old. The rest will be distributed as needed, likely in cooperation with the American Red Cross, with whom we have had a partnership in distributing smoke alarms through their home fire campaign.

This is just one example of how we can serve our communities better by working together.
